

**#NenzaniLaEzweni—Game Over for Muhammad Khan as he is fined R50 000 or 12 months imprisonment, of which half is suspended for a period of five years: Duma says RTI Park Rynie and RTI teams across the province continue to arrest them and show zero tolerance.**

Inkosi Mhlabunzima Maphumulo House: Today, we wish to remind motorists that the no-nonsense Road Traffic Inspectorate team remains firm behind the #NenzaniLaEzweni Operation.

On the 3rd April 2026, we issued a statement following the arrest of a motorist, Muhammad Khan – CASE 41/04/2026. He was nabbed by the No Nonsense RTI Team from Park Rynie clocking 215 km/h in a 120 km/h zone.

This reckless motorist appeared in the Scottburgh Magistrates Court to face a charge of exceeding the general speed limit.

He has been fined R50 000 or 12 months imprisonment, of which half is suspended for a period of five years.

We have in the past arrested well-known criminals, lawyers, engineers, accountants, doctors, police officers, soldiers, bodyguards, undocumented foreign nationals, truck drivers, taxi drivers, pastors, teachers, nurses, prosecutors, civil servants, and many more professionals.

Our message is very clear—nobody is above the law.

Finally, as we approach two long weekends, we will augment our #NenzaniLaEzweni operations with the use of cutting-edge technology.

The Automatic Number Recognition System has been fitted to patrol vehicles.

This technology will enable RTI and Operation Shanela to strengthen intelligence-driven roadblocks to detect unroadworthy, unlicensed and stolen motor vehicles.

Crime Recognition Software: Our teams will use this sophisticated technology to check outstanding fines, summonses, and warrants of arrest.

They will use this tool to issue an electronic fine to an offending motorist.

We express our appreciation to the KZN Police Commissioner, Lt General Nhlanhla Mkhwanazi, the Minister of Justice and Constitutional Development, Mmamoloko Kubayi, and the Director of Public Prosecutions in KwaZulu-Natal, Adv Elaine Harrison, who endorsed the use of this technology.
