

## SPEECH NOTES BY KWAZULU-NATAL MEC FOR TRANSPORT, COMMUNITY SAFETY AND LIAISON MR BHEKI CELE AT THE MEMORIAL SERVICE IN MTUBATUBA ON THURSDAY 02 OCTOBER 2008

## Protocol observed

- Sometimes you wonder why life is so cruel. Our government is working
  tirelessly to ensure that South Africa becomes a safe and a better place for
  all. But our challenge now is that despite our commitment to safety of our
  people, we continue to loose people on our roads.
- Research has shown that a very high percentage of accidents are preceded by a road traffic violation, which makes the improvement of road-user perceptions, attitudes and behaviour a matter of urgency.
- One unfortunate thing about these accidents is that they kill people who are
  economically active. People who drive their cars or travel in public transport
  are mostly working and have dependants. Another thing is that the impact of
  fatalities is seen on people left behind.
- This country has been experiencing about 15 000 fatalities on our roads annually. The estimated cost of the impact of deaths and injuries sustained as a result of road accidents is now R43 billion.

- In spite of numerous campaigns and high profile visible policing, an alarmingly high number of drivers and pedestrians have continuously ignored their responsibility with regard to road safety. This attitude has unfairly jeopardised the safety of other road users and continue to put many lives at risk.
- As a country we seem to think less of the dangers that can afflict us on the road. Unlike most people who practice safe sex, most still do not see misbehaviour on the roads as a virus that will ultimately kill them.
- Speed, drinking and driving, fatigue, unsafe overtaking, ignoring of traffic signals and other traffic signs, general reckless, negligent and agressive driver behaviour, unsafe crossing of roads, drinking and walking, poor vehicle maintenance; unsafe following distances are some of the main causes of accidents.
- I think it is time for all of us who have been driving for such a long time to reevaluate and check our driving habits. Do we, for instance, indicate when we change lanes? Do we wear seatbelts regularly? Do we check our vehicles every time we set off on a journey? Do we obey the basic rules of the road?
- We can have reports and speculations on what may actually have contributed to this terrible event. Nonetheless, the writing is on the wall.
